Respondent # 8

- A4 – I would treat my hard water if I was a full-time resident. It just makes household issue better, but just for the house.

- I7 – re cell phone service as a safety issue: As long as this PROGRESSIVE SERVICE is available it should be provided. It would be cost effective to the residence of CV.
- I7 – re outdated electrical service: [RMP] should be constantly reminded of this by the town. They will not do anything until it is in their best interest, but still I should be reminded of it as a public concern.

Respondent # 39

- I feel that septic are the Town's BIGGEST issue. If the water is bad no life can sustain here. The ability to catch water in all means and even on large community scale should be looked at as a possibility. Even for public water supply. The book Solviva has a worm composting & percing system to handle all waste water & solids—a town-run system could provide local jobs in the valley as well. I hope in 20 years septic are banned.

- It seems with CV's odd power & so many citizens investing in private systems of solar, wind, etc. The town should consider the possibility of it's own alternative power plant. A survey could go out to see if people are planning to install a private system & if they would be willing to donate toward this movement instead. There are many wealthy folks out here that may donate large sums. Coupled with a low-interest loan the town could become an exemplary community for independent sustainable power. We've got sun, wind & H2O. It seems the financial burden could be shared w/citizens beyond taxes.
- I feel that businesses that support (directly) citizens should be allowed in the valley to add to our ability
- To sustain life out here. For example some industrial Apple mill that people of the valley all grew for should be allowed. Basically anything that can be grown, raised, produced on this land should reasonably have the ability to also process these products out here as well. If the land can't produce it – no industrial biz should be allowed. All with in reason – I don't want feed lots by any means but all large scale should not be prohibited if again the product can be produced off the land here!
- I also feel that full time year round citizens should have more weight in these surveys. After all people living here year round have to live full time with decisions based off this survey.

Respondent # 48

- A7 Would it be possible, with owner's permission, to lease one of the existing good wells and still qualify for the state program? Maybe one of the big old wells?
- D3 Home occupations should be limited to the home, or an outbuilding that is for offsite business use only. There should be no offsite employees or traffic on regular basis.
- D3b Home occupations that generate noise, traffic, possible air and ground pollution are unacceptable. When a home occupation is renewed close neighbors should agree that it is not creating problems. Also neighbors should have the first say in whether any new business is acceptable after it meets the existing guidelines. The Town Council should be Very Careful about approving variances. The greener the better.
- E4 Dogs should be kept on the owner's property. When they are not they should be with a person, under voice control or on a leash.

Respondent # 75

- Good info on septic systems from the town. It would be helpful to have on the Town website lists of specific products (brands, for example) that are & are not septic friendly/safe. Can those products be purchased in Moab?
- Although not a direct question here on the survey, the possible amendments to 85-3 would seem to open many questions. For example, it does not seem feasible or appropriate for the Town to prohibit "occupations." It can address types of businesses, but occupations as a choice of individuals, as influenced by education, class, location & many other factors.
- Also, the possible businesses for potential prohibition seems endless, once one business is cited, others can also be included – eg, pest control, trash hauling, pet boarding, food vending, etc.
- And, there is the whole question of enforcing existing & new activities.
- You folks know all this, of course, but I thought I'd add to the difficulties of decision making.

Respondent # 78

- The town council needs to do the dirty work, that's why they are there. If someone on the council knows about a violation they should act on it not have to wait for someone to get so abused that they have to turn in their neighbor. Other towns don't work this way.
- The town should fix the problems we have now and try to make more regs(?)

- Sorry about rambling but this is an example of not following through. Condition on CU are put there for a reason. Good Luck! Compiling all this is daunting. I've done it but good to do.

Respondent # 86

- QA10-11 – There is no evidence that septic systems are endangering our aquifer or that they even could. 90% of the aquifer is fed by Castle Valley Creek & Placer Creek. There is minimal seepage from surface and there is a good recharge rate. My septic is not your concern!
- QG.1 – Very biased question. Should be: Do you favor the Town Government taking an active role in County, State and Federal issues even if the direct connection to life in CV is vague, eg. Mineral leases in outlying areas, big box store in Moab?, uranium mining near Canyonlands?
- QI.1 – Not clear that the Town is "currently protecting and maintaining" several of these: sustainable agriculture, sustainable community, etc. So the question is confusing.
- QB.2 – Natural landscape is very important to us. "Rural character" implies farming, which is antithetical to natural landscape. When you rip up the land to farm/raise livestock, you destroy natural environment, encourage dust and lay the groundwork for sagebrush patches in the future.
- QG.2 – Poorly worded and biased. Should be: Do you favor the Town Council passing resolutions on national issues (such as corporate personhood or energy issues like fracking) to create a Town position on these questions.

Respondent # 94

- Agriculture: We did build here because of the agriculture; however, activities such as the Castle Valley Creamery and Castle Valley Farm are community assets. However, if highly visible, these activities should adequately screened from public view.
- Economy: Restricting an individual's ability to provide economic services is a touchy issues however there should be visual standards require to adequately screen unsightly structures and equipment. This is best handled by a design review process that lets the community comment and work with an applicant to reach an acceptable solution. The Town government should be held to the same accountability.
- Capital Improvements: Providing public services for water and transportation is a good idea but should not be provided free to users. Everyday transportation or transport to Moab could also be handled through a volunteer network provided by residents.
- Our big issue is unpaved roads, public and private, that generate dust clouds by vehicles and wind. Also a problem is property plowed to control weeds leaving loose soil to blow about uncontrolled.

Respondent # 173

- I bought 2 lots with friend in 1988. In 1992-3 we split the lots & had new prop. line surveyed & recorded. The well is now on adjoining prop (no full time resident there for many years. I continue to manage the well & irrigate both lots.
- What is criteria town might/must use to prioritize what is important or deserving expenditure of town time & resources when new concerns are brought to each meeting? What responses are appropriate when a town citizen has strong feelings and expects action to be taken? How can we resist expansion of town government beyond sustainable? And who draws that line, and where to draw it?
- I wonder about the possibility of bike travel as alternative transportation in the valley. Many already do it yet it seems challenging to stay to the edges & still be safe. For older residents, a 3-wheeler might offer a good alternative, but take more room on edge of road & moving off road even more challenging. Side roads each challenge in a different way, but less traffic side would offer fewer dangers to the bike rider. I am not concerned with side streets here just our main thoroughfare. It would be good to travel safely to mailboxes or town bldg. on a bike.

- I would be glad to serve on a research committee re pollinators & re water harvesting with a goal of a sheet of instructions and/or resources. I have good books (recent on both these subjects, which I'd be glad to share or lend. Though these subjects don't get much press in comparison to more obvious threats, they are both crucial) to sustainability.
- Is it possible that regulations could expand to allow the capturing of rain water on lots? Anything prohibited? Is that seen as threatening drainages? Should be encouraged and even best methods instructed.

Respondent # 180

- A7 – Neutral because need more information/explore options before favoring town to spend \$. Agree this could be an excellent community resource. This was looked at in some depth by watershed workgroup appointed by Council (Keeler). Like the idea that it would help to protect aquifer through source protection. Cost should be borne by all but those that need the potable water should pay addition fee—explore options. Seek financing that could offset prop. tax or bond etc. Would be good also to fire protection. H11 is limited to self-serve well & doesn't encompass the broader 'good' of A7.
- E1 – Valley wide, there are a number of outdoor lighting situations that already violate the present ordinance. Also some interior lighting can be just as intrusive as non-compliant outdoor lighting. Mandate curtains?! [small joke]
- E5 – provided letter of support for complaint that was filed.
- E11 – Webpage refers to complaint process ord. as 'experimental process for 2 yrs – thereby "sunsetting" in November 2008. Is it still "on the books"
- F1 – cont'd eg sun/shade issues (blgs, potential mature vegetation) wind disturbance dynamics related to turbine effectiveness
- G2 – not giving TC "carte blanche"; community must have time to discuss in open meeting to gather as much input as possible. Also not sure how survey is using the word "political". Town input on something like BLM/SITLA land swap is absolutely necessary; eg endorsing a political candidate is not appropriate. Any statements/resolutions should be by unanimous vote for TC & mayor.
- Keep on top of water rights for Town & outside town that could affect Town.
- Alternative energy development: research adequate setbacks for all structures etc to ensure that any installation (solar wind etc) is not affected by or affects adjacent property. For solar = shading of bldg. & landscaping (fence, vegetation etc) wind

turbines (currents). As current amendment reads 30 ft for solar may not be far enough.

- Consider adopting passive solar design criteria as well as energy conservative stds into building permit/lot development
- Town could be proactive in getting Utah PSC to require utilities to pay for all electricity that could be fed to the grid by alt. energy sources.
- Consider long range look at other sewage disposal methods—decentralized that would not threaten aquifer.
- Valley wide road dust control due to vehicle traffic is enormous & should be addressed—air pollution, health, respiratory, slowed plant growth (native + crop); degrades road surface.
